Paul Cole, the 2016 RC 12 Award of Excellence Honoree

P. Van: What was your start in the education field?

P. Cole: "In college I worked for a BA in Political Science from Marquette University and a Masters of Science degree from Canisius College. Back in 1961, I started to teach social studies, and continued for 23 years at Lewiston-Porter Senior High School in Youngstown, New York and also I served as president of the Lewiston-Porter United Teachers."

P. Van: *What made you a "force in the labor movement"?* P. Cole: "When I started my career it was clear that if I was to raise my family and stay in teaching, economic conditions would have to improve." And thus I decided early on to get involved in my local union, first as president and then further down the line as a proponent of worker rights and a key player in the creation of New York State United Teachers. **

P. Van: How was the New York State United Teachers created?

P. Cole: "It was evident that New York teachers would be stronger as one organization. I made the motion that AFTaffiliated United Teachers of New York and the National Education Association-affiliated New York State Teachers Association be merged at the 1971 NYSTA convention. That merger created the present-day NYSUT."**

P. Van: What other positions have you had that would be of interest to us?

P. Cole: "I have served as Assistant to the President of the New York State United Teachers (NYSUT) and Political Director of the New York State AFL-CIO prior to my election as Secretary-Treasurer of the State Federation in 1984. My last vote as an AFT vice president was moving to unify NYSUT and NEA/NY. *It was very satisfying. We had come full circle.*" **

P. Van: What have you done in the last few years?

P. Cole: I founded the American Labor Studies Center, which provides resources for teaching about the U.S. labor movement. "He has always believed the common worker wasn't portrayed enough in our national history — the center is an outgrowth of decades of labor history efforts," said Gary Duesberg, former state AFL-CIO education director and a retired NYSUT Board member. **

P. Van: What is one project that the American Labor Studies Center is working on now?

P. Cole: The ALSC purchased the Mullany home in 2002 with state funds, along with the property next door — a boarded-up business that was torn down to make way for a future Kate Mullany Park. The park will be filled with plants common in the 1870s and will be home to a memorial to honor trade union women pioneers. She represents the courage of people in the mid-1800s who went out and risked a lot to organize a union," said Cole. (Source NYSUT United Liza Frenette 4/22/16)

This fall the primary for state legislative offices will be held on Tuesday, Sept. 13. The General election for US President and Vice- President, Senate and Congress and NYS legislators will be Tuesday, Nov. 8. Put those dates in your NYSUT calendar and Smartphone.

Pledge to vote by going to nysut.org and completing the form. Research indicates people who make a signed pledge to vote in elections remember to get out and vote. Exercise your right to participate in the selection of our republic's representatives to keep our democracy strong.

Be an educated voter. NYSUT makes endorsements based on candidates' positions on education and labor issues adopted at our Representative Assembly (RA Convention). Delegates from each NYSUT local can attend the convention to create the NYSUT policies. Before elections every two years, NYSUT holds an Endorsement Conference where each NYSUT local President can attend, with expenses paid by VOTE/Cope funds, to give input and recommendations to the NYSUT Political Action Committee (PAC). The final decisions are made by the NYSUT Board of Directors at a meeting held following the conference.

When you vote, you must consider all the issues important to you. Sometimes people do not vote in their best interests because they fail to take into account all the positions a potential candidate advocates. Do you know whether the candidate will support expanding Social Security or vote to raise the age for eligibility? What is the candidate's position on making Social Security investments subject to the ups and downs of the Wall Street market? What about Medicare and Medicaid? Knowledge is power! Know before you vote so you do not suffer later. As I stated, you make your decisions

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
based on many issues. NYSUT educates you as to the candidate your elected NYSUT locals believe are best on education and labor issues.



Hoodoos

"Water, ice, and gravity are the natural forces that formed the geological "hoodoos" that make Bryce Canyon, Utah unique." (2016 NileGuide.com) This just sums up a little bit of the serene magic and mystery of these features of weathered red/orange spires of stone.

"These hoodoos won't be here forever. Erosion occurs at a rate of about two to four feet per hundred years. Though the loss of these hoodoos will come long after our lifetime, this notion can make one feel an urgency to see a geological element that, in the long run, is a fleeting one." (What on Earth Is a Hoodoo? posted by Sky Barsch Gleaner 10/10/12, 2016 Country Walkers site)

How did these hoodoos start forming? They are formed from subtraction instead of addition. The National Park Service does an excellent job explaining the process with pictures, too: "Hoodoos, which range from five to 150 feet tall, all start their geological life in the same womb—one giant plateau. Individual hoodoos are carved out over eons through the chemical weathering process, as shown in the National Park Service illustration above. These unique structures are formed over centuries as grain after grain of sediment is whisked away by water and wind. When rain water combines with carbon dioxide, carbonic acid is produced, which further erodes the limestone."

Now you know how they were formed, making it much more interesting to see them in person. Bryce Canyon, Utah is just over a 4 hour drive from Las Vegas or Salt Lake City. A direct flight from Albany to Las Vegas in late April is probably the best way to visit the hoodoos at Bryce Canyon. That brings me to an interesting fact in that "Bryce Canyon isn't actually a canyon. It's a natural amphitheater." (2016 NileGuide.com) So do make a plan to visit the hoodoos really SOON!

Consider Joining the RC 12 Committee of 100!!

I volunteered to join the Committee of 100 team from RC 12 in 2002, my first year of retirement. I was extremely grateful to NYSUT and VOTE COPE for their efforts to help members and retirees. I joined the retirement system as a new teacher in 1969 as a Tier 1 member. After taking time out to take care of my two daughters, I returned to teaching in 1979 and found I was now in Tier 3. Needless to say, my retirement benefits had been significantly reduced. There were many NYSUT members in the same situation. Through successful lobbying efforts on our behalf, NY State enacted a law to reinstate members to their original tier. This made a huge difference in the size of my pension and my retirement date. It also made me very interested in the lobbying process.



RC 12 is in a unique position to provide more volunteers for lobbying due to our proximity to the Capital. There is always a need for new retirees to join the process, because they understand what has been happening in the school systems before they retire. Rallies held during the day, press conferences held by legislators in the Albany region, coalition partner meetings like the AQE and Labor-Religion Coalition, and Fight for \$15 events are other examples of activities you can choose to participate in.

You might ask, "What is it like to be a member of Committee of 100?" The time commitment is about 1 or 2 days a year. In March, there is a day for teachers to meet with their legislators at the Capital. Breakfast and lunch buffets are provided at the Desmond in Colonie and volunteers are reimbursed for travel expenses. So, the only cost to you is time and effort. Buses are provided for transport to and from the Capital. Therefore, Albany parking is not an issue. There are also some in district lobby days later in the spring, which are closer to home, because you would be lobbying your own representative in his/her district.

For my first few trips to the Capital I just observed and listened. Each group lobbying a legislator has a few spokespersons to explain the education, health, retirement, and budget issues that are important to members of NY-SUT. As years went by, I felt more confident in my role. Recently, I spoke to the issues of the effect of the tax cap and the Gap Elimination money taken from the districts. I had some specific examples of the terrible effects they were having on students, since my granddaughter was adversely affected by the staff cuts they caused.

Through the last 14 years there have been many crazy changes happening in state government. Governor Pataki retired, Governor Spitzer was elected in 2007 and resigned in March 2008, Governor Patterson took over, Governor Cuomo was elected and became a friend of charter schools, some Democratic senators joined with the Republicans to keep them in leadership in the senate, and legislative leaders were indicted and convicted. Many years were frustrating for both the legislators and the NYSUT members visiting them.

This year was different. The legislators seemed to feel they had more say in the process and I felt they were listening more carefully. I was especially impressed with Assemblymen Butler, Santabarbara, and Steck. Their passionate support of education and teachers is amazing. They all spoke movingly on the importance of public schools.

So, why should you participate? You could be part of the process of government rather than sitting on the sidelines. Convincing legislators to push for more funding for education will help your former colleagues and students. Working to protect retiree benefits helps you and your fellow retirees. It is a way to participate in RC 12 activities. At a RC 12 meeting co-president Jeanne W. Bennett reminded me she met her husband while participating in the Committee of 100.

Whale Watching in the St. Lawrence River ?

Last summer, our family decided to take a short vacation to Quebec. As we investigated the area on the Internet, we were surprised to find whale watching. The Saguenay – St Lawrence Marine Park is 120 miles north of Quebec. This is an area where a deep fiord and a river meet.

You can watch whales from large boats or zodiacs for more adventure and not have to ride for hours. We saw harbor seals, gray seals, beluga whales, Minke whales, and Finback whales. There are even several parks where you can spot whales from the shore. At Cape de Bon Desir Interpretation Center, we saw a Minke whale. Near the Tadoussac ferry we watched several female Beluga whales with their offspring. In August, Blue whales have been spotted.

The parks along the fiord and river also offer fishing, kayaking, hiking, bird watching and photographic viewpoints. There are reasonably priced accommodations at local ski areas in the summer.

She was inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame in Seneca Falls. Kate's house in Troy was designated a National Historical Site and affiliated with the National Park System.
