First Vice-President's Message

There are many issues to share with you at this time. I chose two.

First: New Medicare Cards. Beginning in April 2018, new Medicare cards will be mailed to those on Medicare. Your new number will not be your Social Security number but it will be a number you need to protect. In order to insure your new card is mailed to the correct address, you need to make sure Medicare has it. If your mailing address is not up to date, call 800-772-1213, visit <u>www.myssa.gov</u>, or visit a local Social Security office to update your address. Beware of scams! Medicare does all its communication by mail and will never call you unless you ask them to call. No one should call you requesting information for your new card. There is no charge for your new card so no one should contact you requesting payment. Share this information with your family, friends, and neighbors.

Second: Committee of 100. On March 6, 2018 several hundred educators from around NY State visited with state legislators in Albany. Many issues were discussed. The focus was on an increase in general purpose school aid, returning teacher evaluations (APPR) back to local schools, and to repealing the Receivership Law and giving support to community schools. The importance of Teacher Centers was emphasized along with the Mentor Teacher Intern Program. The legislature was urged to eliminate the obligation of public school districts to fund charter schools, and the legislature was urged to enact transparency and accountability reforms for the charter industry. Many other issues were discussed. NYSUT's presence was a force.

What You May Not Know About the Tax Cut Law?

The new federal tax law increases the deficit by \$1.5 trillion over 10 years. When tax cuts like these are not fully paid for, an existing law called PAYGO is triggered. This requires cuts in many mandatory programs, including **Medicare.** It is expected that the deficit-busting tax bill will require PAYGO cuts to Medicare totaling \$410 billion over 10 years. Medicare cuts of \$25 billion are anticipated. starting in 2018. Call your Congressional representative to tell them to keep Medicare and Social Security strong for generations to come. There is discussion of using the Chained CPI (which was used in the tax bill) to calculate future Social Security cost of living adjustments. This would result in **reduced benefits** if

Identity Theft and You

Identity theft is the most common financial and consumer crime in the United States. The Federal Trade Commission estimates nine million people have their identities stolen each year.

The NY Attorney General suggests the following actions. Pay attention to credit card statements; do not give out personal information by phone, Internet, or mail; shred forms containing personal information; be very cautious in giving out your Social Security number. You can get free credit reports one per year at each of the three credit bureaus. Go to <u>www.annualcreditreport.com</u> to do this.

Are you concerned about the data breach at Equifax? What can you do? You can freeze your credit report at each of the credit bureaus (www.equifax.com

<u>www.experian.com</u> and <u>www.Transunion.com</u>) There is a cost to unfreeze these if you are applying for credit, but no one else can access your credit report. Transunion offers a free service called TrueIdentity that allows you to set up an account with a username and password. Through this account, you can lock and unlock your credit report as needed free of charge. Of course, they also offer to provide other services at a cost.

What do you do if your identity is stolen? According to the NYS Attorney General, you can find out what to do at <u>https://www.identitytheft.gov/</u>. You need to contact the three credit bureaus above to have them place a fraud alert on your account. You also have to contact your bank, credit cards, and other creditors. In addition, contact the local police department to file a report.
